Name of the organisation and person collecting the story: The story was collected by Linus Omondi, the programme Coordinator of KVSO Kenya in a place called Kajiado in Kenya

Who provided the story and in which form: The story was provided in a musical form as is the culture of the Africans in narration and poetry with a lot of adages by one of the elders known as ole sapit

When and where did the challenges/changes illustrated in the story take place: The story happened in the 1950's when he was a young man when there was a strange plant that was brought by one maasai boy named Saitoti. He had sojourned a strange land in present day Tanzania and had carried a plant that seemed exceptionally beautiful in his eyes. He had never seen this plant before and thought to himself that if he carried it and planted it home even the cows would enjoy it's flavour. So he carried a lot of this plant species and put it in his animal skin bag. Luckily when he came back to Kajiado, the rains had just started and so he dug different holes and did the planting. The plant was truly fascinating and it grew in different shades and colours but one an animal ate these strange plant it would collapse and die. So a meeting was held by the villagers to investigate what was really happening. It is when Saitoti after loosing three of his fat cows confessed to have brought a strange plant to the village. The plants were immediately weeded out and burnt and upto this day you cannot go to that village with any plant and plant it there.

What kind of projects were implemented by your organisation in the place the story refers to: KVSO Kenya deals with environmental conservation to improve the tree cover in this area which is a semi-arid area thus receives very little rainfall. The Maasais are a nomadic people meaning they don't paractice agriculture but move with their animals in search for food and pasture. We also try to encourage them on the importance of introducing agriculture as an alternative lifestyle.

What does the storyteller believe is the significance of the events described in the story? The storyteller believes that what they have in their community is enough and they believe that they are satisfied with





that. They believe that sometimes things from outside create calamities just as it happened previously from the story.
